Cognitive linguistics goes beyond the visible structure of language and investigates the considerably more complex backstage operations of cognition that create grammar, conceptualization, discourse, and thought itself." (Fouconnier 2016). Cognitive linguistics is an approach to the description of language that is based on the way we experience, perceive and conceptualize the world. In this course, we will disentangle the (close) relationships which hold between linguistic and cognitive structures. We will explore the ways in which linguistic structures are entrenched in knowledge structures, best described as categories, schemas and frames. To this effect, topics in course inter alia cover the following: - Framing politics: Can our use of language affect the way we vote? - A Cognitive Grammar: Can syntax (SVO, etc.) be meaningful without lexis? - Cognition & Categorization: Is this word form an adjective or adverb? - Figure & Ground: The Role of foreground ... (weiter siehe Digicampus) Linguistic Typology (Seminar) Linguistic typology is a field of research that is concerned with the systematic comparison of language structures. It tries to identify features which are shared by languages all over the world but also looks at where they differ from each other. In her introduction to the field, Velupillai boils this down to three central questions: "what is out there?", "where does it occur?" and "why do we have particular patterns?" (2012: 15). This seminar is directed to students who have a basic linguistic background, but it does not assume any prior knowledge in typology. We will first get a

general overview of the field and then discuss language universals and language types. Finally, we will compare English to various languages all around the world, focusing on a number of aspects, such as sound inventory, case system, syntactic patterns and word order, politeness, or language change.

North American Dialectology (Seminar)

This seminar consists of a theory-based dialectological part and a descriptive part. First, we will look at the importance of mechanisms and causes of language change, which lead to the formation of new dialects and eventually languages (geographical and sociological aspects are considered especially). The second part will then provide an overview of dialectal variation in the English spoken in North America, i.e. regional (Southern, Northeastern, Midwestern etc) and social (AAE, Chicano English, Youth Speech etc.).

Persuasion & Deception (Seminar)

Persuasion and deception are arguably two of the most pervasive strategies for which language is used in everyday life. Yet, while it seems easy to recognise persuasive language in advertisements, political speeches, even casual conversations, describing exactly how and why we were swayed to believe something we did not before is much harder. This seminar sets out to explore the linguistic techniques we apply in such contexts of use in order to persuade and deceive each other. We aim to uncover the ways we can use to detect and delineate them in a systematic fashion. More specifically, the course will focus on... - various methods which capture verbal manipulation (rhetorics, CDA, appraisal studies, critical stylistics, conceptual metaphor theory, etc) - various persuasive genres (advertisements, political discourse, media discourse, institutional talk, etc) - various speech communities, e.g. pick-up artists, email hoaxes (online tricksters), politicians, film trailers, scientists) - ... (weiter siehe Digicampus)

Sociolinguistics (Seminar)

For more than half a century already, sociolinguistics – the study of language in its social context – has been a major field of study within linguistics. In this seminar we take both a theoretical and a hands-on approach to the fundamental issues sociolinguists have been concerned with over the past few decades, including language variation and change, language contact, the relationship between language use and social identity, as well as language planning and language policy. These topics will be examined by means of representative case studies on different varieties of English around the world. In addition, as methodology is important for any kind of empirical research, we will discuss and practice some of the methods for collecting and analyzing sociolinguistic data.

The Grammar of Crime (Seminar)

This is a course for students interested in the world of crime! So, come and join us as forensic trainees to explore the linguistic methods needed to uncover a myriad of real and fictional crime mysteries . As prospective forensic analysts, you will be assigned individual case files, involving linguistic puzzles or legal conundrums to be resolved in teams of two. Practical work on your case files will take place in the first six successive sessions of the term. Your mission objectives involve (a) closely reading and interpreting relevant linguistic studies, (b) applying existing forensic tools and methods on selective texts, (c) finding the theoretical and practical limitations of your approach and (d) showcasing your results to your fellow students to induce further discussion. In the second part of the term, each forensic team will introduce the case to the group, explain its analysis, tactics and results. Mystery case files may include.... At the beginning of the semester we will first access the concept of performance from different theoretical points of view in the texts of Judith Butler, Michel de Certeau and others and will then apply those approaches to three contemporary city texts. Our focus will then be on the analysis of the nexus between language, power and action in the various instances of performance in those texts such as the characters' walks through the city, the specific image of the city that is created through the perception of the protagonists and the political implications that might be derived from those performances. Please obtain copies of the following novels: Siri Hustvedt: The Blindfold. Teju Cole: Open City. One further text will be added. ... (weiter siehe Digicampus) Court Room Fiction (BA) (Proseminar) The topic of this course relates to the interdisciplinary field of Law and Literature and deals with the depiction of law in literature and film. We will take a closer look at courtroom novels/fiction as a subgenre of crime fiction and analyze in more detail the (medium-specific) depiction of aspects/concepts such as justice and guilt as well as implications of ethnic and regional backgrounds. We will discuss Harper Lee's To Kill a Mockingbird and David

Film (Proseminar)

Students taking the seminar "Film" in the module EAS-1411 will automatically be allotted to the corresponding Übung "Film Analysis" (Sabrina Mittermeier, Thursdays 5.30 – 7 p.m.). Please be sure to keep this slot free. This seminar wants to introduce students to the medium of film, discussing narrative and genre conventions, as well as how to analyze it academically using the toolbox of film studies. The corresponding Übung will delve deeper into film analysis and both classes will work with a wide variety of examples spanning several decades of American film history, structured according to genres such as drama, comedy, horror or science fiction.

Introduction to Shakespeare (Proseminar)

More than 400 years after his death, William Shakespeare (1564-1616) is still the most-produced playwright in theatres around the globe and his works continue to fascinate a wide audience of theatregoers and readers. Apart from around 39 plays, Shakespeare wrote a cycle of 154 sonnets and several longer narrative poems. It is the aim of this seminar to make students familiar with Shakespeare's work, its major themes and socio-historical contexts. To this end, we will read a selection of his sonnets as well as one example each of the three broad genres of plays Shakespeare's dramatic work has traditionally been divided into, tragedy, comedy and history plays. We will look at these texts both in connection with their genre (what is it that differentiates a comedy from a tragedy? what makes a tragedy tragic? etc.) and in the context of the Early Modern period, specifically its politics and gender relations. Students must obtain their own copies of the plays we will read (to be decided yet ... (weiter siehe Digicampus)

PS Travel Literature (Proseminar)

This seminar examines a wide range of travel literature from late medieval times to the present. Based on a discussion of key theoretical approaches to travel writing and debates in postcolonial studies, we will scrutinize how travel accounts (re)produce knowledge and negotiate self/other binaries. We will take into consideration different purposes of traveling (from exploration and conquest to tourism) and mediums of publication (from print to social media). Richardson vs. Fielding: The Rise of the Novel in the 18th Century (Proseminar)

Although the term "novel" defies easy definition and although literary history provides many earlier examples of extended prose fiction, the 18th century is widely regarded the time during which the modern novel came into being and was established as a genre in its own right. In this development, English writers may be said to have led the way, and while Defoe's *Robinson Crusoe* (1719) is often called the first English novel, it is with the works of Samuel Richardson and Henry Fielding that the novel fully reaches its characteristic combination of realism, individualism, and psychological introspection. Richardson's spectacularly successful epistolary novel *Pamela* (1740) decidedly shifts the narratorial focus from the events themselves to the heroine's reflections on them, inviting the reader to engage emotionally with her tribulations and character development. Fielding's picaresque and panoramic *Joseph Andrews* (1742), parodying *Pamela* and mocking Richardson's pious middle-class ... (weiter siehe Digicampus)

Zugeordnete Lehrveranstaltungen: Cognitive Linguistics (Seminar) "What is cognitive linguistics? Cognitive linguistics goes beyond the visible structure of language and investigates the considerably more complex backstage operations of cognition that create grammar, conceptualization, discourse, and thought itself." (Fouconnier 2016). Cognitive linguistics is an approach to the description of language that is based on the way we experience, perceive and conceptualize the world. In this course, we will disentangle the (close) relationships which hold between linguistic and cognitive structures. We will explore the ways in which linguistic structures are entrenched in knowledge structures, best described as categories, schemas and frames. To this effect, topics in course inter alia cover the following: - Framing politics: Can our use of language affect the way we vote? - A Cognitive Grammar: Can syntax (SVO, etc.) be meaningful without lexis? - Cognition & Categorization: Is this word form an adjective or adverb? - Figure & Ground: The Role of foreground ... (weiter siehe Digicampus) Linguistic Typology (Seminar) Linguistic typology is a field of research that is concerned with the systematic comparison of language structures. It tries to identify features which are shared by languages all over the world but also looks at where they differ from each other. In her introduction to the field, Velupillai boils this down to three central questions: "what is out there?",

“where does it occur?” and “why do we have particular patterns?” (2012: 15). This seminar is directed to students who have a basic linguistic background, but it does not assume any prior knowledge in typology. We will first get a general overview of the field and then discuss language universals and language types. Finally, we will compare English to various languages all around the world, focusing on a number of aspects, such as sound inventory, case system, syntactic patterns and word order, politeness, or language change.

North American Dialectology (Seminar)

This seminar consists of a theory-based dialectological part and a descriptive part. First, we will look at the importance of mechanisms and causes of language change, which lead to the formation of new dialects and eventually languages (geographical and sociological aspects are considered especially). The second part will then provide an overview of dialectal variation in the English spoken in North America, i.e. regional (Southern, Northeastern, Midwestern etc) and social (AAE, Chicano English, Youth Speech etc.).

Persuasion & Deception (Seminar)

Persuasion and deception are arguably two of the most pervasive strategies for which language is used in everyday life. Yet, while it seems easy to recognise persuasive language in advertisements, political speeches, even casual conversations, describing exactly how and why we were swayed to believe something we did not before is much harder. This seminar sets out to explore the linguistic techniques we apply in such contexts of use in order to persuade and deceive each other. We aim to uncover the ways we can use to detect and delineate them in a systematic fashion. More specifically, the course will focus on... - various methods which capture verbal manipulation (rhetorics, CDA, appraisal studies, critical stylistics, conceptual metaphor theory, etc) - various persuasive genres (advertisements, political discourse, media discourse, institutional talk, etc) - various speech communities, e.g. pick-up artists, email hoaxes (online tricksters), politicians, film trailers, scientists) - ... Sociolinguistics (Seminar)

For more than half a century already, sociolinguistics – the study of language in its social context – has been a major field of study within linguistics. In this seminar we take both a theoretical and a hands-on approach to the fundamental issues sociolinguists have been concerned with over the past few decades, including language variation and change, language contact, the relationship between language use and social identity, as well as language planning and language policy. These topics will be examined by means of representative case studies on different varieties of English around the world. In addition, as methodology is important for any kind of empirical research, we will discuss and practice some of the methods for collecting and analyzing sociolinguistic data.

The Grammar of Crime (Seminar)

This is a course for students interested in the world of crime! So, come and join us as forensic trainees to explore the linguistic methods needed to uncover a myriad of real and fictional crime mysteries. As prospective forensic analysts, you will be assigned individual case files, involving linguistic puzzles or legal conundrums to be resolved in teams of two. Practical work on your case files will take place in the first six successive sessions of the term. Your mission objectives involve (a) closely reading and interpreting relevant linguistic studies, (b) applying existing forensic tools and methods on selective texts, (c) finding the theoretical and practical limitations of your approach and (d) showcasing your results to your fellow students to induce further discussion. In the second part of the term, each forensic team will introduce the case to the group, explain its analysis, tactics and results. Mystery case files may include....
