<p>Modulteil: V Literary Studies: Introduction PO 08</p> <p>Lehrformen: Vorlesung Sprache: Englisch / Deutsch SWS: 2 ECTS/LP: 5</p> <p>Zugeordnete Lehrveranstaltungen:</p> <p>Introduction to American Literary Studies (Vorlesung) The course is designed to acquaint students with the terminology, methods, and techniques of literary studies (Part I) by analyzing texts taken from various literary periods and genres (Part II). The course thus offers a first overview of American literary history from the colonial period to the present. Students in the "Lehramt Gymnasium" program as well as Bachelor's students majoring in "Anglistik/Amerikanistik" are required to take the "Supplementary Course: American Literary Studies" alongside this lecture. Since the final exam for these programs covers both courses, they should be attended within the same semester. Students in other programs do not need to take the supplementary course but are welcome to do so on a voluntary (non-credit) basis.</p> <p>Introduction to English Literary Studies This course introduces students to important concepts, genres, terms and methods of analysis in English literary studies. It offers systematic knowledge of genres in literary studies (poetry, drama, narrative), gives an introduction to the diverse theoretical contexts of the study of literature (literary theory), and provides basic information about the historical development of English literature. Furthermore, students will be made familiar with elementary techniques of research and essential study aids in English literary studies. In certain degree programmes (e.g. LA Gymn. Englisch, BA-Hauptfach Anglistik/Amerikan., BA Vergl. Lit.wiss. mit Angl./Amerik.), students are required to attend a supplementary course ("Begleitübung") or tutorial. Poetry Analysis (Übung)

Poetry analysis is one of the five major areas relevant to literary studies (prose, drama, poetry, film, and literary theory). This course is intended for all students of English and American Studies, who should have attended courses in all five of these areas before they register for their final exams. The course provides a comprehensive introduction to the key concepts of poetry analysis and its various critical approaches. For this purpose we will analyze a wide range of selected poems that comprise the major epochs of English literature. In order to fully understand these texts, we shall also explore their respective historical and literary contexts.

Survey of English Literature II: The Long Eighteenth Century (Übung)

This survey course is the second of a four-part series covering English literary history from the 16th century to the present. This term we will focus on English literature of the so-called "long" 18th century, and thus include Neo-classicism (or Augustan Age) up to the beginnings of Romanticism at the turn of the 19th century. In this course, participants are expected to read a wide range of textual samples and examples by relevant authors. A reader with assorted texts will be available at the beginning of term. Besides that, students are required to obtain their own copies of the following books: • Daniel Defoe, *Robinson Crusoe* • Jonathan Swift, *Gulliver's Travels* • Jane Austen, *Sense and Sensibility* It is highly advisable to read at least one of these before the beginning of term in order to alleviate the reading load during the semester. Ü Diversity in Cultural Studies (Übung)

As an academic exercise cultural studies is based on the conviction that the study of cultural processes, such as the production, circulation and use of cultural artifacts, is important to an in depth understanding of the ways in which "power" manifests itself in the social and political orders of all human communities. Diversity studies enquire into common structures of oppression based on constructions of hegemonic identities, e.g. male, white, heterosexual, etc. It looks at the cultural contributions in society, culture and history of those historically underrepresented and denied access to power due to their racial, class, gender, sexual, etc. identities.

Poetry Analysis (Übung)

Survey of English Literature II: The Long Eighteenth Century (Übung)

This term we will focus on English literature of the so-called "long" 18th century, and thus include Neo-classicism (or Augustan Age) up to the beginnings of Romanticism at the turn of the 19th century. In this course, participants are expected to read a wide range of textual samples and examples by relevant authors. A reader with assorted texts will be available at the beginning of term. Besides that, students are required to obtain their own copies of the following books: • Daniel Defoe, *Robinson Crusoe* • Jonathan Swift, *Gulliver's Travels* • Jane Austen, *Sense and Sensibility* It is highly advisable to read at least one of these before the beginning of term in order to alleviate the reading load during the semester. Big Love - Liebe und Liebesdramaturgien im Film (Proseminar)

Was ist Liebe? Das schönste Gefühl auf Erden? Der schlimmste Schmerz überhaupt? Der Zauber des Lebens oder doch nur Gehirnchemie? Wie sehr sich die Wissenschaft auch darüber den Kopf zerbricht, die Liebe bleibt ein Rätsel – und das größte Motiv innerhalb der Filmgeschichte. Im Mittelpunkt des Seminars steht insbesondere die Frage nach den in Liebesfilmen entfalteteten emotionalen Dramaturgien, die unser kulturelles Verständnis von Liebe und Liebesbeziehungen prägen. Zudem wird der Zusammenhang von Liebesbeziehungen und Kultur- bzw. Naturprozessen untersucht – denn schließlich, was sind die Quellen emotionaler Beziehungsenergien?

Lyrical Ballads (Proseminar)

The publication of William Wordsworth' and Samuel Taylor Coleridge's „Lyrical Ballads“ (1798-1800) marked the beginning of the Romantic movement in England. Breaking with neoclassicist aesthetics and emphasizing individual imagination, this new form of poetry sought to reflect the subject's estrangement in the light of industrial and political processes of modernization. In this course, we are going to approach the „Lyrical Ballads“ by a close reading of selected poems. In order to be able to fully understand these texts, we shall also explore their socio-historical context and discuss key concepts of English Romanticism.

Postmodernist Fiction (Proseminar)

Postmodernism is an excitingly diverse and multi-faceted literary and cultural phenomenon and at the same time a hotly contested term. In this seminar we will try to delineate some of the central notions and ideas surrounding postmodernism and, in particular, postmodernist fiction. Postmodern texts are typically associated with innovation and radical formal experiment. Such texts often show an ironic detachment, self-reflexivity and a sceptical attitude towards realism. Together we will look at some of the theoretical and philosophical foundations of postmodernism and see how they can be related to the three novels discussed in class. Surveying just a small part of the cornucopia that is postmodernism, this course will tackle questions of storytelling and claims to the accuracy of (hi)story (cf. historiographic metafiction), (the limits of) representation, and constructions of identity. The three novels we will discuss are: Angela Carter, *Nights at the Circus* (1984) Julian Barnes, *A Hi...* (weiter siehe Digicampus)

PS Rewriting the Ramayana (Proseminar)

The first written version of the Hindu epic Ramayana, composed between 700 and 500 BC, is generally ascribed to the Sanskrit poet Valmiki. Based on these ancient verses, various adaptations, retellings and translations of the magical adventures of prince Rama and his heroic rise to power have been created. In this seminar we explore contemporary versions of the Ramayana and analyze their changing political, social, cultural and philosophical implications. Primary sources include short stories from the anthology *Breaking the Bow* (2012), playwright Peter Oswald's stage adaptation and Deepak Chopra and Shekhar Kapur's futuristic comic book series *Ramayan 3392 AD* (2007-2015).

Romantic Love in the 19th Century English Novel (Proseminar)

English literature in the 19th century saw the transition from Romanticism to Victorianism and the rise of the novel as the dominant genre – developments that are inextricably linked with and reflect profound changes in society and its norms and values. The outspoken emotionalism and often unmistakable sexual overtones of Romanticism had to give way to Victorian sobriety and purity. However, ideas of love and marriage that had developed during the 18th and early 19th century and that, under the label of "Romantic Love", are still today among the most powerful discourses of love, underlie both the novels of the Romantic and the Victorian period. In this course, we will analyse three of the most popular love stories – not only of the 19th century but of all time, according to a 2007 Guardian poll. Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice* (1813, ranked #2), Emily Brontë's *Wuthering Heights* (1847, ranked #1), and Thomas Hardy's *Far From the Madding Crowd* (1874, ranked #10) will be discussed... (weiter siehe Digicampus)

Shakespeare's Tragedies (Proseminar)

Inhalt: The seminar will turn to major examples of William Shakespeare's tragedies such as *Hamlet*, *Othello*, *Macbeth*, und *King Lear* as well as to one of Shakespeare's so-called 'problem plays', *Measure for Measure* – all of which belong to the most representative and successful plays of dramatic literature worldwide. The seminar will introduce students to the contemporary background of Shakespeare's times and the Elizabethan tradition of theatre and drama. Moreover, from a more theoretical point of view, the seminar will discuss various theories of "tragedy" ranging from an Elizabethan understanding of the term to contemporary, 20th century approaches. Textual work will be devoted to the nature of tragedy, to Shakespeare's language and dramatic structure and to the intricate psychological complexity of the plays at issue. Various film versions of the plays will be integrated into the seminar work. Einführende Lektüre bzw. Textgrundlagen: For concise discussions and classwork I would sugg... (weiter siehe Digicampus)

The "Grotesque" in American Literature (Proseminar)

What does "the grotesque" really mean? Is it the absurd, bizarre, strange, deformed, abnormal? Descriptions of grotesqueness "embrace uncertainty over certainty" (Edwards). Transgressive grotesque corporealities, deformation and otherness as well as psychological disorientation refer to both the body and also the psyche, touch the human figure as well the physically anthropomorphized animal. The grotesque was defined as caricature, monstrosity and sin (Horace), it was classified as horror and terror (Kayser), but also seen as carnevalesque laughter (Bakhtin). The grotesque form - in art and literature - was also a way of expressing a new found freedom of creativity and thinking, a way of connecting to the environment without strict boundaries. This seminar will concentrate on the "grotesque", "monstrosity" and the "monstrous" in American fiction. What do these

terms really mean? How have the definitions and associations with these terms changed until now? After some theoretical approach... (weiter siehe Digicampus)

Transmedialität: Literatur, Film und Theater in der ersten Hälfte des 20. Jahrhunderts (Proseminar)

In this seminar we will look at theater, literature, and film of the first half of the 20th century. Of particular interest will be the movements, continuities and discontinuities, and the transformation of discourses from media-theoretical, production-related, and philological perspectives. Which conceptual dependencies, which models and figures, which media-specific techniques coin these forms of cultural production, and in which relationships do they stand to each other? These and related questions will be approached through the theoretical texts by (among others) Siegfried Kracauer, Walter Benjamin, or Hugo Münsterberg. The seminar will be held both in German and in English.

American Drama from the 1920s to the Present (Übung)

This seminar introduces students to a variety of representative plays as we set out to explore and discuss major themes and aesthetic trends of American drama in the 20th and 21st century. Particular focus will be paid to the creative achievements of O'Neill, Williams and Miller in relation to their concern with American society and culture of the early 20th century. In the second part of the seminar, we will consider major examples of African American drama, aesthetic movements such as the "theatre of the absurd", postmodern drama and current developments in contemporary drama, focusing on issues of dramatic form but also the critical potential of situating the plays within the American socio-cultural context. In order to develop an in-depth understanding of the creative vitality of American drama and theater, we will read a number of plays and a few short excerpts of major examples and consider a selection of texts on the literary history of American drama and theater. (Tentative) se... (weiter siehe Digicampus)

Contemporary American Short Stories (Übung)

This course focuses on very recent American short stories. Participants will deepen their knowledge of analyzing narratives and their various topics. How has the contemporary short story developed when compared to classic American canonized short fiction? On what kind of issues focus the contemporary writer, and how do they do it? Is there a return to realism and naturalism, or are more experimental forms of the modern detectable? How does our contemporary life filter through those narratives? --> This course will be a block seminar in January 2017. Check digicampus for the exact dates as well as the mandatory first meeting in October!

Cultural Studies 2 (Übung)

Diversity Matters – Interdisziplinäre Perspektiven auf Gender und Diversität (u.a. auch für EWS-AP-11) (Übung)

Literature and the Sciences (Übung)

This course will use an interdisciplinary way of analyzing literary works in terms of natural sciences and the humanities. How do literary narratives engage in science discourses? How does literature include and discuss medicine, psychiatry, AI and ALife, Cybernetics, Ecology, Animal Studies etc.? What typical features of representing natural sciences can we detect? From "mad scientists" to a clear critique of medicalization and a too positive view on technical and post-human developments, we will read canonized works of American literature as well as newer forms of (science) fiction combining literature and the sciences. ----> This course will be a block seminar in November. There will also be a mandatory meeting in October.

Playing Estranged Worlds - Video Games and the Science Fiction Imagination (Übung)

Video games and the genre of science fiction share a fundamental commonality: the desire to explore strange worlds that differ from our everyday experience. Even more than in literature or film, the video game medium allows its player to embark on imaginative adventures to faraway places and estranged worlds, and, therefore, represents a welcome escape from our empirical present. Such escapism, however, rarely designates a complete departure from the contemporary world we've come to know, but rather enables the appreciator to see it afresh —to give her or him a fresh perspective on it. Consequently, in involving the player in estranged gameworlds, the SF genre in video games not only scrutinises the ills of our contemporary present, but also places mankind itself in the spotlight. Zugeordnete Lehrveranstaltungen: Late Modern English & Standardization (Proseminar) This seminar gives an overview of significant historical processes (Industrial Revolution, urbanisation, scientific discoveries... etc.) and their interplay with actual language use, as well as a review of the most important factors that influenced the development of the English language in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Late Modern English (1700-1800) features not only changes in syntax (which already started in Early Modern English) but also innovations such as the emergence of a standard pronunciation (RP) and the increase of loanwords of either Latin or Greek etymology. We will look at ego-documents (letters, autobiographies, diaries...), journals (Tatler, Spectator...), various grammars and work with electronic research tools (ECCO, OED) in order to reconstruct and comprehend the process of language standardisation. PS Foreign Accent (Proseminar) Foreign accent is an unavoidable problem for all adult learners - or is it? In any case there certainly are big individual differences between speakers. A lot of factors are responsible for why someone may be better than someone else, and this class will cover them all: age/neural organization, motivation, experience, input, personality, learning styles, memory etc. The class will also introduce different forms (segmental and prosodic) and models of foreign accent that may predict problems and errors and allow us to improve or perhaps even sound native (sometimes ...). Finally, this seminar will also describe different methods of instruction and discuss the perception of foreign accent in society.

PS History of English (Proseminar)

In this class we will trace back the roots of the English language starting with its genealogical origins as an Indo-European and Germanic language, and then describe its development through the major periods of Old, Middle and Early Modern English up to Modern Day English. All the major linguistic levels such as phonetics/phonology, morphology, syntax and lexicon will be investigated by means of the basic methods and principles of Historical Linguistics, but also by analyzing original texts. We will also take into consideration which external influences (e.g. Viking invasions, Norman conquest) both contributed to and caused the specific changes the English language underwent.

PS Morphology (Proseminar)

This seminar deals with issues of advanced morphological theory. Lexical Morphology, for example, considers the word, not the morpheme to be the central unit of analysis and represents the lexicon as a hierarchical structure that allows for the interaction of morphological and phonological processes. PS Phonetics and Phonology (Proseminar)

This seminar offers an introduction to the principles of Phonetics and Phonology, including the articulatory basis, feature descriptions and an account of both British (RP) and American standard pronunciations. An additional focus will be on phonological transcriptions both using IPA and the systems expected in the Bavarian state exams.

PS Pragmatic Markers (Proseminar)

Marking turn and discourse structure, signalling speakers' attitudes and awareness of the hearer, and indexing common ground, pragmatic markers like well, anyway, right, like or I mean are intrinsic features of both spoken and written discourse. Within the last decades, the multifunctional items have become the centre of attention of various branches of linguistics, leaving them one of the fuzziest and most hotly debated topics in current linguistics. The aims of this course are to compare and contrast the most prominent approaches to pragmatic markers, drawing on relevant studies and accounts, and to analyse and discuss their functions on various levels of linguistics, carrying out our own analyses of authentic material from the internet, corpora and other sources.

PS Second Language Acquisition (Proseminar)

Sociolinguistics (Proseminar)

This course serves as an undergraduate-level introduction to the study of language in its social context. It provides first insights into the various approaches to this area of investigation, including the sociology of language, the ethnography of speaking, discourse analysis and quantitative sociolinguistics. Applying the basic concepts and terminology, we will cover a variety of topics, such as regional and social variation, gender differences, language and power, politeness phenomena or language contact.

Telecinematic Discourse (Proseminar)

Are films texts? How do we analyze film? How do actors talk in films? How does language used in television differ from face-to-face interaction? How is speech and image interlaced in telecinematic discourse? The two main objectives of this course are (a) to let you learn how to aptly transcribe and analyze telecinematic discourse and (b) how to engage in corpus linguistic methods of analyzing the language of film characters.

Translation Studies (Proseminar)

Translation has always played an essential part in facilitating communication across linguistic and cultural borders. Yet what exactly does it mean to translate? What is a good/bad translation? How can we describe linguistically what happens in a translation? In order to answer these questions, we will focus on a variety of aspects: prominent conceptualisations of translation and translatability throughout the 20th and 21st centuries, the shifting concepts of equivalence and the increasingly recognised role of the translator and the situational and cultural context, linguistic approaches to describing translation methods and techniques, as well as the particular constraints and affordances of interpreting and multi-medial translation such as voice-over, dubbing and subtitling.

In this seminar we will try to delineate some of the central notions and ideas surrounding

postmodernism and, in particular, postmodernist fiction. Postmodern texts are typically associated with innovation and radical formal experiment. Such texts often show an ironic detachment, self-reflexivity and a sceptical attitude towards realism. Together we will look at some of the theoretical and philosophical foundations of postmodernism and see how they can be related to the three novels discussed in class. Surveying just a small part of the cornucopia that is postmodernism, this course will tackle questions of storytelling and claims to the accuracy of (hi)story (cf. historiographic metafiction), (the limits of) representation, and constructions of identity. PS Rewriting the Ramayana (Proseminar)

Romantic Love in the 19th Century English Novel (Proseminar)

English literature in the 19th century saw the transition from Romanticism to Victorianism and the rise of the novel as the dominant genre – developments that are inextricably linked with and reflect profound changes in society and its norms and values. The outspoken emotionalism and often unmistakable sexual overtones of Romanticism had to give way to Victorian sobriety and purity. However, ideas of love and marriage that had developed during the 18th and early 19th century and that, under the label of "Romantic Love", are still today among the most powerful discourses of love, underlie both the novels of the Romantic and the Victorian period. In this course, we will analyse three of the most popular love stories – not only of the 19th century but of all time, according to a 2007 Guardian poll. Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice* (1813, ranked #2), Emily Brontë's *Wuthering Heights* (1847, ranked #1), and Thomas Hardy's *Far From the Madding Crowd* (1874, ranked #10) will be discussed... Shakespeare's Tragedies (Proseminar)

Inhalt: The seminar will turn to major examples of William Shakespeare's tragedies such as *Hamlet*, *Othello*, *Macbeth*, and *King Lear* as well as to one of Shakespeare's so-called 'problem plays', *Measure for Measure* – all of which belong to the most representative and successful plays of dramatic literature worldwide. The seminar will introduce students to the contemporary background of Shakespeare's times and the Elizabethan tradition of theatre and drama. Moreover, from a more theoretical point of view, the seminar will discuss various theories of "tragedy" ranging from an Elizabethan understanding of the term to contemporary, 20th century approaches. Textual work will be devoted to the nature of tragedy, to Shakespeare's language and dramatic structure and to the intricate psychological complexity of the plays at issue. The "Grotesque" in American Literature (Proseminar)

Transgressive grotesque corporealities, deformation and otherness as well as psychological disorientation refer to both the body and also the psyche, touch the human figure as well the physically anthropomorphized animal. The grotesque was defined as caricature, monstrosity and sin (Horace), it was classified as horror and terror (Kayser), but also seen as carnevalesque laughter (Bakhtin). The grotesque form - in art and literature - was also a way of expressing a new found freedom of creativity and thinking, a way of connecting to the environment without strict boundaries. This seminar will concentrate on the "grotesque", "monstrosity" and the "monstrous" in American fiction. What do these terms really mean? How have the definitions and associations with these terms changed until now? After some theoretical approach... (weiter siehe Digicampus)

PS Foreign Accent (Proseminar) Foreign accent is an unavoidable problem for all adult learners - or is it? In any case there certainly are big individual differences between speakers. A lot of factors are responsible for why someone may be better than someone else, and this class will cover them all: age/neural organization, motivation, experience, input, personality, learning styles, memory etc. The class will also introduce different forms (segmental and prosodic) and models of foreign accent that may predict problems and errors and allow us to improve or perhaps even sound		

native (sometimes ...). Finally, this seminar will also describe different methods of instruction and discuss the perception of foreign accent in society.

Transmedialität: Literatur, Film und Theater in der ersten Hälfte des 20. Jahrhunderts (Proseminar)

In this seminar we will look at theater, literature, and film of the first half of the 20th century. Of particular interest will be the movements, continuities and discontinuities, and the transformation of discourses from media-theoretical, production-related, and philological perspectives. Which conceptional dependencies, which models and figures, which media-specific techniques coin these forms of cultural production, and in which relationships do they stand to each other? These and related questions will be approached through the theoretical texts by (among others) Siegfried Kracauer, Walter Benjamin, or Hugo Münsterberg. The seminar will be held both in German and in English.
