Inhalte: Einführung in grundlegende Theorien, Konzepte, Ansätze und Methoden der Fremdsprachendidaktik, darunter Hinführung an fremdsprachendidaktische Forschungsfragen, Fachinhalte und Lernziele, Grundlagen des Fremdspracherwerbs und Schwerpunktfragen des Fremdsprachenunterrichts; Einbindung in berufs- und praxisbezogene Kontexte.		
Lernziele/Kompetenzen: <u>Fachlich:</u> Die Studierenden verfügen über grundlegende Kenntnisse in der Fachdidaktik des Englischen. Sie sind in der Lage, fachbezogene Lehr- und Lernprozesse theoretisch zu begründen. Dabei differenzieren sie Kompetenzen und methodische Umsetzungen sowie deren Überprüfung. Die Studierenden begreifen Lehr-/Lernprozesse als komplexes Zusammenwirken fachlicher, personenbezogener, institutioneller und bildungspolitischer Faktoren. <u>Methodisch:</u> Die Studierenden lernen, auch längere Instruktionsphasen konzentriert zu verfolgen und eigenständige Notate anzufertigen. Sie können mit fachdidaktischen Grundlagentexten selbstständig umgehen und wissen diese im Rahmen der Vor- bzw. Nachbereitung von Lehrveranstaltungen gewinnbringend zu nutzen. <u>Sozial/personal:</u> Die Studierenden lernen grundlegende Formen wissenschaftlicher Kommunikation kennen. This introductory lecture will give you an overview of TEFL (Teaching English as a Foreign Language). We will cover basics (e.g. objectives, teacher, learner, media, lesson planning), methodology (e.g. Balanced Teaching, cooperative learning, practising, playing, CLIL), competences (e.g. listening-viewing, speaking, reading, writing, mediating, vocabulary, grammar, intercultural communicative competence) as well as assessment (e.g. class tests).

Introduction to the Teaching of English - Nicht für Erstsemester geeignet (ausgenommen Master)! (Vorlesung)

This interactive lecture will provide an overview of key aspects and current debates in the field of TEFL (Teaching and Learning English as a Foreign Language). Participants have the opportunity to familiarize themselves with the topics: European and national language learning policies, language teacher education and development, (second) language learning theories, individual differences, language teaching methodology, the teaching, learning and testing of the language domains (pronunciation, vocabulary, grammar) and the four skills (listening, speaking, reading, writing) as well as culture, media and literature in the foreign language classroom. If required by your study course, also register for one of the compulsory supplementary courses. Please note that the supplementary course must be attended in the same semester as the lecture. The topics of both courses are relevant for the final exam. The lecture is also accompanied by a weekly tutorial for revising and consolidating knowled ... (weiter siehe Digicampus)

Aspects of Teaching English in Primary School (Proseminar)

Allgemeine Themen und Fragen der Didaktik des Englischunterrichts in der Grundschule (Verbindung zwischen Theorie und Praxis): Theoretische Ansätze des Fremdspracherwerbs, Methoden, Kommunikative Kompetenzen, LehrplanPLUS, Unterrichtsplanung, digitales Lernen, bilinguales Lernen, exemplarische Themen des Lehrplans mit Materialsammlung Erarbeitung einer Präsentation zu einem Lehrplanthema, die als Basis für die Hausarbeit dient.

Core practices for teaching TEFL (Proseminar)

In this course, we will identify core practices (e.g. McDonald et al. 2013) for teaching TEFL and build content knowledge on them. Examples of core practices in TEFL include, for example, facilitating whole-class discussion, eliciting student thinking and explicitly explaining and modelling content. We will analyse representations of practice (ways to show what this skill looks like and break it down into its component parts) and we will approximate practice by trying out these skills. With the support of peer feedback, you will start learning how to enact them competently.

Digital Reading (Proseminar)

Individual Differences in Foreign Language Learning (Proseminar)

Due to globalization and rapid technological developments, the profile of foreign language learners has drastically changed. Such a change makes a more careful consideration of individual learner differences by prospective foreign language teachers necessary. Therefore, this seminar provides students a thorough understanding of the most important areas such as learning strategies and learning style, culture, foreign language aptitude, and intelligence. Some questions to be discussed are as follows: What is it that makes for a good language learner? Why do some learners of foreign languages excel, while others struggle? How do learner characteristics relate to effective language learning? What could be the implications for the foreign language teaching situation?

Methods of Teaching English in Elementary School (Proseminar)

Learning English at elementary school should be a unit of "head, heart and hand". This means cognitive, emotional and practical skills should be stimulated and used during the lesson in various activities. How can teachers have pupils listen to and talk in the foreign language with all their senses and without any shyness. Many concepts and various different approaches were discussed since the beginning of teaching English to younger learners. This seminar should introduce typical methods and techniques of teaching a foreign language in elementary school. Together we will develop an ABC with necessary methods and techniques for the elementary school.

Research in Foreign Language Teaching (Proseminar)

In this seminar we will explore different stages of writing a research paper, such as limiting the topic, preparing a bibliography, developing a thesis statement and an outline, and different techniques for summarizing or paraphrasing. Moreover, we will have a closer look at recent publications about English Language Teaching to gain a deeper insight into current TEFL research, e.g., articles from journals and edited books.

Teaching Cultural Studies: UK (Proseminar)

The cultural component of foreign language acquisition has received greater emphasis again since the end-1990s – not only in schools, but also in adult education. The acquisition of a practical understanding of the target culture and society, including a knowledge of relevant historical, geographical and political issues, has thus become an important element in teacher training programs. This Proseminar offers an in-depth insight into the United Kingdom and how to teach cultural studies in the classroom.

Sie präsentieren Lektüreeergebnisse, eigene methodische Erprobungen oder bereits eigene Forschungsunterfangen (aus dem Kontext der Abschlussarbeit) und vertreten diese im wissenschaftlichen Gespräch. Die Studierenden erarbeiten sich selbstständig und im wissenschaftlichen Diskurs Lösungsmöglichkeiten für konkrete (Staatsexamens-)Aufgaben.		
<u>Sozial/personal:</u> Die Studierenden vertiefen ihre Fertigkeiten im sach- und adressatengerechten wissenschaftlichen Diskurs. Sie festigen eigene Positionen und zeigen gleichzeitig Respekt und Aufgeschlossenheit für die Interessen und Leistungen anderer. Generell lernen die Studierenden, mit einem hohen Arbeitspensum umzugehen. Dabei werden Konzentrationsfähigkeit und Zeitmanagement gefördert.

Distance Learning & Digital Media in TEFL (Hauptseminar) This seminar wants to explore the "strange new worlds" of distance learning – or are these so strange after all? In the course of this pandemic, the only feasible way to reach out to learners of English was via online platforms		

and video conference tools. Although these have been used by many (interested and invested) teachers, their use was completely new to other educators, as such tools never formed a part of their training at or after university. This seminar aims to provide the participants with an overview of the historical development of IT-based learning tools just as much as with an overview of some / most (but never all) the media available out there. It goes without saying that the latter media also need to undergo close methodological scrutiny as to their benefit and usefulness. On top, the psychological implication of "distance" courses just as much as methodological approaches to organise such a form of learning will be dealt with. Teaching, learning and testing reading in TEFL (Hauptseminar)

In this course, we will chart the field of reading in a first and second language systematically. First, we will find out how reading works in general and how reading differs for second language learners by exploring key studies in the field. Second, we will work on reading-curriculum principles and evidence-based teaching ideas. Then, we will analyse resource materials for classroom instruction and for testing the reading skills of our learners.

Using Short Narrative Text in Teaching English as a Foreign Language (Hauptseminar)

There are several ways to enhance language teaching experience by supplementing coursebooks. One of them is using short narrative texts that help language teachers go beyond their daily teaching routine in a creative and flexible way. After examining the theoretical background, we will explore different techniques to implement short narrative texts for English Language Teaching, e.g., short stories, anecdotes, tweets, etc.

The reading of Yaa Gyasi's Homegoing (2016) and Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie's Americanah (2013) will be supplemented by essays and short stories on the topic to explore the ways in which questions of (cultural) identity, community, home and belonging are (re)negotiated both in the novels and other discourses on the African diaspora. Students are expected to buy and read the following novels: Adichie, Chimamanda Ngozi. Americanah. Fourth Estate, 2014. Gyasi, Yaa. Homegoing. Penguin Random House, 2016. Other texts and materials will be provided via Digicampus. (weiter siehe Digicampus) Contemporary Indian Fiction (Proseminar) In this course, we will explore the the ways in which contemporary Indian literature in English addresses the aftermath of colonialism and the emergence of India in the global world, where India is viewed both as a

zone of transnational migrations and as a place where caste and gender divides are perpetually reasserted. Indian contemporary fiction thus becomes an ambivalent, hybrid and subversive space. The course aims at understanding key concepts and examines different approaches to the analysis of such texts, particularly in relation to postcolonialism. The seminar will investigate acclaimed Indian texts which delve into concepts of identity, migration, language, polyphony and agency. Students have to buy and read the following novels: *The God of Small Things* by Arundhati Roy *Sea of Poppies* by Amitav Ghosh

Futurism(s) in Global Anglophone Fiction (Seminar)

In the words of American science fiction writer Samuel R. Delany, thinking about how the world might be in the future is “a particularly important exercise for those who are oppressed.” Examining the gradual diversification of Anglophone speculative fiction over the last century, in this course we will engage with different notions of and approaches to futurism across a broad range of African American, Caribbean, Indigenous North American, African and Indian contexts. In addition to futurist short fiction from the 1920s to the present, we will closely examine two novels, Tade Thompson’s *Rosewater* (2016) and Samit Basu’s *The City Inside* (2022), to discern the influences of literary globalization on current futurist imaginaries. While selected short fiction and supplementary readings will be made available via Digicampus, participants have to buy and read the two novels before the beginning of the semester. PS: Shakespeare's Poetry (Proseminar)

The aim of this course is to give an introduction to William Shakespeare’s poetry. We will approach his poetical works by a close reading of "Venus and Adonis", "The Rape of Lucrece", "A Lover's Complaint", "The Phoenix and the Turtle", as well as of selected sonnets. In order to be able to fully understand these texts, we shall also explore their literary and socio-historical contexts. A reader with assorted primary and secondary literature will be made available at the beginning of term.

PS: Shakespeare's Tragedies (Proseminar)

Inhalt: The seminar will turn to major examples of William Shakespeare’s tragedies such as Hamlet, Othello, Macbeth, und King Lear as well as to one of Shakespeare’s so-called ‘problem plays’, Measure for Measure – all of which belong to the most representative and successful plays of dramatic literature worldwide. The seminar will introduce students to the contemporary background of Shakespeare’s times and the Elizabethan tradition of theatre and drama. Moreover, from a more theoretical point of view, the seminar will discuss various theories of “tragedy” ranging from an Elizabethan understanding of the term to contemporary, 20th century approaches. Textual work will be devoted to the nature of tragedy, to Shakespeare’s language and dramatic structure and to the intricate psychological complexity of the plays at issue. Cultural Analysis: Musicals: Broadway Under Spyglass (Übung)

While musicals are neither native to the United States nor the invention of the 20th century, Broadway has become an epitome of American theatrical iconography, and has conquered the world in its various iterations in London, Melbourne, and Hamburg. The aim of this course is to examine musical and theatrical tropes and trends both on stage and in their ever-growing movie adaptations. Special attention will be paid to how audio-visual aspects of musicals construe a story in accordance with (or subverting) paragons of Broadway productions. This Übung comprises a written Portfolio as the final task. Key musicals under discussion: *Hamilton* – Available on Disney+ *In the Heights* - Available on Prime Rent – Available on Netflix

Drama Analysis (Übung)

This course provides students with the basic theoretical frameworks and practical skills needed for analysing drama. We will discuss and apply the most essential concepts of drama analysis, from ancient and Early Modern theories of tragedy and the distinction between absolute and epic drama to methods of figure characterisation, the categories of time and space, and contemporary discussions concerning the relation between text and performance. We will work with two full-length plays, which will be announced shortly and excerpts from various plays from different historical periods and of different genres, which will be made available on Digicampus. Drama analysis is one of the five major areas relevant to literary studies (prose, drama, poetry, film, and literary theory). This course is intended for all students of English and American Studies, who are advised to have attended courses in all five of these areas before registering for their final exams.

HS: Unreliable Narration (Hauptseminar)

Ever since Wayne C. Booth introduced the concept of "unreliable narration" in "The Rhetoric of Fiction", it has been the subject of controversial discussions. The term has been used in various ways across different theoretical frameworks, but at its core, it refers to a narrator whose account or commentary has to be called into question by the (implied) reader. In this seminar, we will delve into the history and theory of unreliable narration through a comprehensive examination of relevant theoretical texts. We will then develop a formal-functional definition and apply it to various examples in English literature, focusing on contemporary English novels by authors such as Patrick McGrath. Additionally, we will also take into account selected works from previous epochs and other Anglophone literatures, including the works of Edgar Allan Poe, William Faulkner, and Samuel Taylor Coleridge, to broaden our understanding of unreliable narration across different cultural contexts.

Hauptseminar: Anglophone Antigones (Hauptseminar)

How to tell stories of tragic conflict? Sophocles' tragedy "Antigone" has frequently served as a matrix for not simply retelling the ancient story, but for telling stories of contemporary social and political conflict. From apartheid in South Africa (in Athold Fugard, John Kani, and Winston Ntshona's "The Island") or the situation of homeless people in New York (in Janusz Glowacki's "Antigone in New York") to the disappeared in Mexico (in Sara Uribe's "Antígona González"), refugees at Europe's fortified borders (in Thomas Köck's "Antigone"), or immigrants in Montreal (in Sophie Deraspe's eponymous film), "Antigone" has been adapted as a frame to address and criticize a range of power relations in contemporary societies. In this class, we will look at select Antigones in Anglophone literatures - two plays and two novels - that address very different contexts and constellations: "Antigone Nick" (2012), a play by the Canadian poet and playwright Anne Carson, which focuses on questions of I

Hauptseminar: Relationality and More-Than-Human Storytelling (Hauptseminar)

How can writing and storytelling, a practice so intimately tied to the human perspective and thus presumably human-centered qua definition, provide adequate perspectives for an age in which humanity's self-centeredness is considered the driving force behind ecological disasters and global climate change? Particularly in recent years, the adoption of the term "Anthropocene" was accompanied by a call to re-think and challenge the role of the human on Earth: not only in the Natural Sciences but specifically in the Humanities, anthropocentric understandings of humans' allegedly unique subject position have rightfully come under scrutiny. The perhaps severest criticism in this regard has come from the fields of posthumanism and material ecocriticism, where scholars are interested in theorizing beyond the human as well as in critically assessing and dismantling the "exceptional" status that humans have continually attributed to themselves. Some go as far as to propose a philosophy that integ

Theorizing Popular Cultures (Projektseminar)

In this advanced bi-weekly research seminar we will review, examine and discuss theories of popular culture with a focus on debates surrounding globalization. Based on a problem-based learning approach and in continuous consultation with the instructor, participants will have to work on their own or group research projects throughout the semester and apply theoretical approaches to specific examples of their own choice. Hence, prior knowledge of and experience in cultural studies and cultural analysis is expected. The seminar will be accompanied by presentations and discussions of current research projects and demands a willingness to engage with a broad variety of contexts and theories. Participants' projects are to be presented at the annual NELK student conference in November 2023.

Cultural Analysis: Musicals: Broadway Under Spyglass (Übung)

While musicals are neither native to the United States nor the invention of the 20th century, Broadway has become an epitome of American theatrical iconography, and has conquered the world in its various iterations in London, Melbourne, and Hamburg. The aim of this course is to examine musical and theatrical tropes and trends both on stage and in their ever-growing movie adaptations. Special attention will be paid to how audio-visual aspects of musicals construe a story in accordance with (or subverting) paragons of Broadway productions. This Übung comprises a written Portfolio as the final task. Key musicals under discussion: Hamilton – Available on Disney+ In the Heights - Available on Prime Rent – Available on Netflix

Drama Analysis (Übung)

This course provides students with the basic theoretical frameworks and practical skills needed for analysing drama. We will discuss and apply the most essential concepts of drama analysis, from ancient and Early Modern theories of tragedy and the distinction between absolute and epic drama to methods of figure characterisation, the categories of time and space, and contemporary discussions concerning the relation between text and performance. We will work with two full-length plays, which will be announced shortly and excerpts from various plays from different historical periods and of different genres, which will be made available on Digicampus. Drama analysis is one of the five major areas relevant to literary studies (prose, drama, poetry, film, and literary theory). This course is intended for all students of English and American Studies, who are advised to have attended courses in all five of these areas before registering for their final exams.

Examenskolloquium Amerikanistik (Kolloquium)

Dieses Kolloquium dient der gezielten Vorbereitung auf die fünf amerikanistischen Körbe des Staatsexamens English. Examenskolloquium Englische Literaturwissenschaft (Kolloquium)

Das Examenskolloquium bereitet Studierende auf das Lehramt-Staatsexamen im Fachgebiet Englische Literaturwissenschaft vor, indem Anregungen zur Prüfungsvorbereitung sowie Anleitungen zur gezielten, erfolgreichen Planung des Examens gegeben werden. Die Studierenden werden mit den Anforderungen des schriftlichen Staatsexamens der LPO I von 2008 im Fach Englisch/Literaturwissenschaft vertraut gemacht und erhalten Strategien für die Klausurvorbereitung. Dazu werden Beispiele für Klausuraufgaben diskutiert und wichtige historische Fakten und gattungstypische Fachbegriffe wiederholt. Teile des Kolloquiums werden als Blockveranstaltung gehalten. Die Zeiten werden zu Beginn des Semesters bzw. in dessen weiterem Verlauf rechtzeitig angekündigt.
