Introduction to the Teaching of English - Nicht für Erstsemester geeignet (ausgenommen Master)! (Vorlesung)

This introductory lecture will provide an overview of core dimensions related to TEFL (Teaching English as a Foreign Language). We will cover basics (e.g. objectives, teacher, learner, lesson planning), teaching methodology, communicative competences (e.g. listening-viewing, speaking, reading, writing, mediating, vocabulary, grammar), intercultural education, media and assessment. If required by your study course, please also register for one of the compulsory supplementary courses. The supplementary course must be attended in the same semester as the lecture. The topics of both courses are relevant for the final exam. The lecture is also accompanied by a weekly tutorial, in which the topics are revised and consolidated.

Aspects of Teaching English in Primary School (Proseminar)

Allgemeine Themen und Fragen der Didaktik des Englischunterrichts in der Grundschule (Verbindung zwischen Theorie und Praxis): Theoretische Ansätze des Fremdspracherwerbs, Methoden, Kommunikative Kompetenzen, LehrplanPLUS, Unterrichtsplanung, digitales Lernen, bilinguales Lernen, exemplarische Themen des Lehrplans mit Materialsammlung Erarbeitung einer Präsentation zu einem Lehrplanthema, die als Basis für die Hausarbeit dient.

Individual Differences in Foreign Language Learning (Proseminar)

Due to globalization and rapid technological developments, the profile of foreign language learners has drastically changed. Such a change makes a more careful consideration of individual learner differences by prospective foreign language teachers necessary. Therefore, this seminar provides students a thorough understanding of the most important areas such as learning strategies and learning style, culture, foreign language aptitude, and intelligence. Some questions to be discussed are as follows: What is it that makes for a good language learner? Why do some learners of foreign languages excel, while others struggle? How do learner characteristics relate to effective language learning? What could be the implications for the foreign language teaching situation?

Methods of Teaching English in Elementary School (Proseminar)

Learning English at elementary school should be a unit of "head, heart and hand". This means cognitive, emotional and practical skills should be stimulated and used during the lesson in various activities. How can teachers have pupils listen to and talk in the foreign language with all their senses and without any shyness. Many concepts and

various different approaches were discussed since the beginning of teaching English to younger learners. This seminar should introduce typical methods and techniques of teaching a foreign language in elementary school. Together we will develop an ABC with necessary methods and techniques for the elementary school.

Research in Foreign Language Teaching (Proseminar)

In this seminar we will explore different stages of writing a research paper, such as limiting the topic, preparing a bibliography, developing a thesis statement and an outline, and different techniques for summarizing or paraphrasing. Moreover, we will have a closer look at recent publications about English Language Teaching to gain a deeper insight into current TEFL research, e.g., articles from journals and edited books.

Teaching Cultural Studies: Australia (Proseminar)

The cultural component of foreign language acquisition has received greater emphasis again since the end-1990s – not only in schools, but also in adult education. The acquisition of a practical understanding of the target culture and society, including a knowledge of relevant historical, geographical and political issues, has thus become an important element in teacher training programs. This Proseminar offers an in-depth insight into Australia and how to teach cultural studies in the classroom.

In this seminar students are introduced to the different concepts of authenticity. Most agree that learning materials are authentic | | |

when they have not been produced for the express purpose of language instruction. However, questions of authenticity are by no means confined to TEFL materials. The course content will range from the philosophical to the practical, spanning issues of learner autonomy, motivation, and materials, to name but a few.

Distance Learning & Digital Media in TEFL (Hauptseminar)

This seminar wants to explore the “strange new worlds” of distance learning – or are these so strange after all? In the course of this pandemic, the only feasible way to reach out to learners of English was via online platforms and video conference tools. Although these have been used by many (interested and invested) teachers, their use was completely new to other educators, as such tools never formed a part of their training at or after university. This seminar aims to provide the participants with an overview of the historical development of IT-based learning tools just as much as with an overview of some / most (but never all) the media available out there. It goes without saying that the latter media also need to undergo close methodological scrutiny as to their benefit and usefulness. On top, the psychological implication of “distance” courses just as much as methodological approaches to organise such a form of learning will be dealt with. Examples of tools used in English classes

Optimizing Teacher Talk and Classroom Interaction: Developing Classroom Discourse Competence (CDC) (Hauptseminar)

Inhalt: Course Background: The past twenty or so years have seen a strong focus on learner- and outcome-orientation in foreign language education. At the same time, the development of EFL teachers’ professional competences in pre-service education has been largely neglected. Only rather recently, there has been a discernible shift towards (theoretical and empirical) research into EFL teacher professionalization and the professional competences that EFL teachers need in order to teach English effectively and successfully. One of the key competences is teachers’ professional classroom discourse competence (CDC) – a competence construct that goes far beyond the mere notions of general ‘foreign language competence’ or ‘language proficiency’. This seminar acknowledges the fact that teacher talk matters as it has a significant influence on the extent to which language learning in the EFL classroom is really initiated and promoted – or perhaps even hindered and impeded. Selecting Coursebooks for Teaching English: Theory and Practice (Hauptseminar)

There is a rich palette of materials to implement for contemporary language teaching. This situation makes their careful selection, adaptation, and supplementation quite essential. Our seminar explores the analysis of coursebooks and some supplementary teaching materials for English. First, we will discuss what aspects must be taken into consideration for analyzing coursebooks, e.g., cultural, and educational aspects. Course participants will be given an opportunity to analyze a coursebook which is used in their future school form. Then, we will gain a deeper insight into the teaching materials by the presentation of our guest speakers.

Teaching Communicative Competences in Primary School (Hauptseminar)

Using Short Narrative Text in Teaching English as a Foreign Language (Hauptseminar)

There are several ways to enhance language teaching experience by supplementing coursebooks. One of them is using short narrative texts that help language teachers go beyond their daily teaching routine in a creative and flexible way. After examining the theoretical background, we will explore different techniques to implement short narrative texts for English Language Teaching, e.g., short stories, anecdotes, tweets, etc.

| Zugeordnete Lehrveranstaltungen: PS Indigenous Speculative and Climate Fiction (Seminar) Despite Indigenous peoples being disproportionately affected by climate catastrophes, Indigenous voices and critical perspectives on the Anthropocene are sidelined in debates about the climate crisis and a more sustainable future. Indigenous literatures ask us to engage with Indigenous knowledges and practices of relating differently to the land and human and non-human agents. In the proseminar "Indigenous climate fiction and speculative fiction", we will read two novels, <i>The Marrow Thieves</i> by Cherie Dimaline (Métis) and <i>Moon of the Crusted Snow</i> by Waubgeshig Rice (Anishinaabe) as well as a selection of Indigenous-authored short stories. Our primary readings will be accompanied by theories of Indigenous speculative fiction and climate fiction as well as Indigenous literatures and storytelling more broadly. This includes narrative techniques of nonlinear temporality, the Native Apocalypse and elements of oral storytelling that are included in the written form. We will situate our reading ... (weiter siehe Digicampus) PS Modernist Northamerican Drama (Seminar) In the late 19th and early 20th century, society was transformed by technological advances, industrialization and capitalism as well as new philosophical movements, urbanization and historical events with far-reaching consequences. These shifts can be traced throughout the entire range of the arts in the international phenomenon |

of modernism. "In English-language literary contexts, modernism is sometimes used as a catchall term for any kind of literary production in the interwar period that deals with the modern world. More narrowly, it refers to work that represents the transformation of traditional society under the pressures of modernity, and that breaks down traditional literary forms in doing so" ("American Literature 1914-1945" 677). Even though theater and performance have been a staple of American culture before the turn of the 20th century, it is often claimed that drama as a "self-conscious literary form" (683) only developed slowly in North America and only came into its own ... PS: Romantic Poetry (Proseminar)

The aim of this course is to give a comprehensive introduction to the poetry of English Romanticism. We will approach this epoch by a close reading of the major poems of the so-called "Big Six", i.e. William Blake, William Wordsworth, Samuel Taylor Coleridge, Lord Byron, Percy Bysshe Shelley and John Keats. Additionally, we will discuss exemplary poems by Charlotte Smith and Anna Laetitia Barbauld. In order to be able to fully understand these texts, we shall also explore their socio-historical context and key concepts of English Romanticism.

PS: Shame in Post-Celtic Tiger Irish Fiction (Proseminar)

The affect of shame establishes social norms, values, and borders, both in the sense of border-creating and border-crossing. In this course, we want to explore how these socio-cultural dynamics transpire in cultural productions in the form of Post-Celtic Tiger Irish novels, novels in which the (new) cultural, social, and ideological borders that have emerged in the course of Irish globalisation are negotiated and juxtaposed against old ones. For this, please obtain copies of Sally Rooney's novel *Conversations with Friends*, Naoise Dolan's *Exciting Times* as well as Mike McCormack's *Solar Bones*. Theoretical texts will be made available for download.

PS: The British Short Story (Proseminar)

The seminar will turn to the British Short Story, a literary genre which, since the days of Edgar Allan Poe—whose theory of the short story, or 'brief tale' shall be at the beginning of our discussion—has undergone a significant development. Drawing on earlier examples from the 19th-century, our focus shall be modernist and postmodernist examples of the genre from James Joyce, Virginia Woolf to the contemporary writers such as A. L. Kennedy, Kazuo Ishiguro, Jackie Kay, Ali Smith, Zadie Smith, Hillary Mantel, Angela Carter, Ian McEwan, and John Burnside. A selection of theoretical material and the short story texts will be made available online in a folder here on digicampus.

PS: Trends in Theatre After 1950 (Proseminar)

In this course we will investigate the historical development of drama and performance from 1950 onwards. Several plays will be analysed from authors like Samuel Beckett, John Osborne, Harold Pinter, Caryl Churchill, Martin Crimp or Sarah Kane to exemplify the different trends arising in that period. The aim of this course is to give a broad overview of the different styles and aesthetics of the theatre after 1950, starting with Berthold Brecht. The analysis of several plays will thus be combined with additional discussions on theatre trends like Epic Theatre, the Theatre of the Absurd, the Angry Young Men, In-Yer-Face Theatre or the Postdramatic Theatre. We will also discuss and apply the most essential concepts of drama analysis, like methods of figure characterization, the categories of time and space and contemporary discussions concerning the relation between text and performance. The course will be reading-intensive and students will be expected to be familiar not only with the p ... (weiter siehe Digicampus)

Postcolonial Fiction (Proseminar)

What constitutes the 'postcolonial'? What kind of perceptions and ideations do we hold towards postcolonial literature? The course aims at understanding key concepts of postcolonial theory and examines different approaches to the analysis of such texts that are primarily viewed as non-canonical in a Western English Studies context. The course will have a strong intersectional focus in terms of gender, sexuality, race, class and caste, including different theoretical perspectives such as feminist studies, gender studies, critical race theory, etc. The seminar will investigate 'texts from the margins' which delve into concepts of identity, ambivalence, agency and subjectivity. Students have to buy and read the following novels: *Lucy* by Jamaica Kincaid *Purple Hibiscus* by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie *The God of Small Things* by Arundhati Roy

Postmodernism (Proseminar)

The aim of this course is to get acquainted with one of the most versatile modes of discourse – Postmodernism. As a reactionary movement aiming to deconstruct the modernist myth of metanarratives, postmodern literature has brought about a shift in the perception of narratives. Self-referential, playful and often cynical, postmodern novels subvert common literary tropes, invite careful analysis and broaden the scope of understanding of how literature works. In this course, we will look at the most prominent theoretical texts on the nature of postmodernism and apply them in the analysis of selected novels. Students have to buy and read the following novels: The New York Trilogy by Paul Auster White Noise by Don DeLillo Other texts and excerpts will be provided.

Furthermore, the handmaid outfits inspired by the novel have featured prominently in women's protests across the world. In this course we will examine all major versions of Atwood's narrative – including the 1990 film, the 2019 graphic novel and the opera – against the backdrop of theories of adaptation, transmedia storytelling and storyworld approaches to discern how the literary dystopia of Gilead has inspired artists and protesters alike. In addition, we will discuss how Atwood's 2019 'sequel' <i>The Testaments</i> complicates the narrative of power in Gilead. Finally, the TV adaption of Atwood's 1996 novel <i>Alias Grace</i> will further our theoretical observations. Students must buy and read all three novels and the graphic novel and have access to the movie as well as the two TV series via streaming services or DVD. Fo ... What are wastelands? Generally the term designates areas deemed desolate, uncultivated, and "unfit for use." Yet, the word can evoke manifold spaces: ruins, deserts, contaminated landscapes, other planets. In this course, we will cast a variety of spotlights on such wastelands: from T.S. Eliot's eponymous poem *The Waste Land*, to contemporary American Anthropocene fiction that looks at wasting the planet's resources. Frameworks such as extraction, capitalism, colonialism, will play a role, but also the unexpected aliveness of spaces believed to be barren, like the desert. Wastelands in American fiction are also frequently "moral" wastelands, which focus on meaningless and devastation of life, which is also a core theme for Eliot, who focuses on the damages done (both material and mental) by WWI. In this sense we will also attempt to broaden our perspective on wastelands by tracing different meanings of waste – and by including newly forming theoretical approaches, such as *Discard Stuffs* ... HS/OS/KOL NELK Media and Globalization

In this advanced research seminar we will examine and discuss current theories of globalization in relation to shifts in media and cultural studies approaches. While participants should have prior knowledge of and experience in cultural analysis, we will work out the theoretical texts and contexts together and apply them to specific examples. The seminar will be accompanied by presentations and discussions of current research projects and demands a willingness to engage with a broad variety of contexts and theories. Credit for the listed modules can be obtained through small research projects that will be arranged in individual consultations and are to be presented at the NELK research day in February 2023.

HS: Literature and Community (Hauptseminar)

The etymology of the word community can be traced back to the Latin word "communitas", which means "shared in common and public spirit". Hence, community denotes a group of people living in the same place or having a particular characteristic or a likeness in common. There is no distinct diversity among them; they share common characteristics such as religion, language, caste, age, sex, family and kinship, profession, and, residence. Therefore, homogeneity acts as a core element in a community. Different from that, a society has a much wider scope in comparison to community. A society is characterized by heterogeneity embracing people having different conflicts and differences. Hence, likenesses, as well as conflicts, exist simultaneously within a society. However, since society is vast, there is every possibility of adjustment and cooperation between people. Furthermore, defined geographic locality is not an essential element for society, unlike for a community. The seminar will turn ... (weiter siehe Digicampus)

HS: Myth(s) in British Literature (Hauptseminar)

Greek mythology is one of the major cultural sources of Western civilization. Numerous myths and characters have been adopted in different national literatures throughout various epochs. In this seminar we will, firstly, discuss the term "myth" and its philosophical, psychological, and especially aesthetic implications. Afterwards, we will analyze adaptations of Greek mythology throughout the history of English literature. The selected texts will range from early modern times (e.g. Philip Sidney, Edmund Spenser, William Shakespeare), Romanticism, Modernism up to Postmodernism as well as comprise various genres. In order to fully understand these texts, we shall also explore their respective socio-historical and literary contexts. A detailed reading list will be made available at the beginning of term.

Literature and Human Rights/ Blockseminar (Hauptseminar)

Critics have long seen a close relation between literature and human rights. Historian Lynn Hunt (2007) and literary scholar Jonathan Slaughter (2007), for instance, see a direct connection between the emergence of the Bildungsroman and the epistolary novel and the development of modern human rights regimes. Life writing, and the testimonio in particular, are important vehicles of witnessing and testifying on human rights violations. Last but not least, literary texts, both fictional and non-fictional, potentially confront the reader with questions regarding personhood and the "grievability" (Butler 2004) of human lives. Since the Universal Declaration of Human Rights in 1948, human rights have a – however fragile – legal international framework that has become an important reference point for political and social activism; at the same time, legal frameworks – both national and international – have become important touchstones in literary texts, too, and the concept of 'human rights' s ... 20th and 21st Century Drama and Theatre, Part II (Vorlesung)

The lecture will turn to the major developments of twentieth and twenty-first century theatre and drama in the UK and Ireland. We shall start with the 19th century heritage and writers like George Bernard Shaw and shall then turn to the so-called "well-made play", TS Eliot, and Samuel Beckett. Emphasis will be given to the various productive 'waves' of what has gained a world-wide reputation as the "New British Drama" starting with John Osborne's *Look Back in Anger* in 1956 and leading up to the very present of the 21st century. A bibliography will be provided for the students.

Adaptation in Theory and Practice (Übung)

This course aims to implement a hands-on approach to various adaptation theories and their application across a variety of different media. Students will encounter and work with a number of contemporary adaptation theorists, including Linda Hutcheon, Deborah Cartmell, Thomas Leitch, and Julie Sanders. We will deal with a variety of contemporary examples and their adapted texts. Adaptations under consideration include *The Sandman* (available on Netflix), *Persuasion* (available on Netflix), *The Lizzie Bennett Diaries* (YouTube shorts) and *Wicked, The Musical* (presented in class). Students are expected to acquire and read *Persuasion* by Jane Austen; other texts and excerpts will be provided. For the modules EAS-1854, EAS-1781, EAS-1782 and EAS-1783, this course is best combined with the HS: *From Page to Screen: Margaret Atwood* (Prof. Dr. McPherson)

Narrative Analysis: Postmodern and Postcolonial Short Fiction (Übung)

This course serves as an introduction to central concepts of narrative analysis, including narrative situation, time and space, unreliability etc. Discussions of theoretical texts lay the foundation for the analysis of selected postcolonial and postmodern short stories, practicing the application of relevant concepts in close reading exercises. This course is hands-on and interactive and aims to provide students with the conceptual vocabulary and methodological approaches to interpreting narrative fiction, a necessary skill both in regard to writing term papers in literary and cultural studies and (if applicable) the state exam. All course materials will be provided via Digicampus. For the 2-course-module EAS-1411, this Ü is to be combined with one of the following PS: "Postmodernism" (Danica Stojanovic) "Postcolonial Fiction" (Ankita Dolai)

Poetry Analysis (Übung)

Poetry analysis is one of the five major areas relevant to literary studies (prose, drama, poetry, film, and literary theory). This course is intended for all students of English and American Studies, who are advised to have attended courses in all five of these areas before registering for their final exams. The course provides a comprehensive introduction to the key concepts of poetry analysis and its various critical approaches. For this purpose we will analyze a wide range of selected poems that comprise the major epochs and genres of English literature. In order to fully understand these texts we shall also explore their respective historical and literary contexts.

Ü Drama Analysis (Übung)

This Übung will acquaint students with the basic skills needed for the analysis of dramatic texts. By looking at two full-length plays and some further excerpts as well as influential theoretical backgrounds, students will gain insight into all essential elements of drama analysis. We will discuss and apply aspects of structure and dramatic speech as well as concepts of time, space and characterization. By examining a variety of different American plays, we will explore the genre as a whole, but also distinguish between categories of epic and absolute drama. Students

will need to acquire two plays (tba), additional material will be made available in a reader at the beginning of the semester. One session will take place in the evening (time and date tba) as we will go on a theater excursion together. Students attending the seminar "Modernist Northamerican Drama" within the module EAS-1411 will automatically be allotted to the Übung "Drama Analysis" (Milena Krischer, Fri 11.45-13.15).

Ü Prepper Culture in Literature and Film (Übung)

In this course, we will look into the fascinating and ongoing history of so-called survivalism and prepper culture after EOTW (End of the World). The fact that the world does still exist contributed to a manifold history of this culture of individual or group preparedness to survive what is called the DoomsDay, including the major Blackout and a new world order (The Great Reset). Various literary and film genres refer to this kind of prepper culture, such as zombie narratives, virus infection narratives (enforced by the recent Corona crisis), nuclear fear narratives or world war scenarios as well as climate change angst narratives. Beginning from the mid-1940s on, the fear of worldwide devastating catastrophes that change the world as we know it forever produced the social, political and/or cultural movements of „survivalists“ or „doomsday preppers“ with distinct personal and social behavioral patterns, architecture, design, agriculture, food etc. The course investigates into these soc

Ü: Narrative Analysis (Übung)

This Practice Course (Übung) has the aim to offer a structured overview over core concepts and categories of narratology (the study of narrative structure) and to practice their use in the analysis of narrative texts. We will consider, for example, the role of time and space in narrative, the question of narrative situation (Who speaks? Who perceives?) with recourse to both the models of Gérard Genette and Franz Stanzel, strategies of rendering consciousness, and narrative (un)reliability. As an Übung, this course will place a focus on applying and practicing the concepts that we read about in theory, so preparatory reading of texts and active participation are both vital and required. All texts will be made available via digicampus.

'Postcolonial', 'Transcultural' and 'Anglophone World Literature': Key Texts and Contexts (Vorlesung)

These survey lectures examine key texts from various anglophone regions against the backdrop of literary and historical developments as well as theoretical shifts from concepts of postcolonial literature to more recent transcultural approaches and emerging theories of anglophone world literature. Each lecture will focus on a selection of literary texts to illustrate their key topics, literary strategies and interpretive frameworks in the context of these theoretical developments.

Examenskolloquium Englische Literaturwissenschaft (Kolloquium)

Das Examenskolloquium bereitet Studierende auf das Lehramt-Staatsexamen im Fachgebiet Englische Literaturwissenschaft vor, indem Anregungen zur Prüfungsvorbereitung sowie Anleitungen zur gezielten, erfolgreichen Planung des Examens gegeben werden. Die Studierenden werden mit den Anforderungen des schriftlichen Staatsexamens der LPO I von 2008 im Fach Englisch/Literaturwissenschaft vertraut gemacht und erhalten Strategien für die Klausurvorbereitung. Dazu werden Beispiele für Klausuraufgaben diskutiert und wichtige historische Fakten und gattungstypische Fachbegriffe wiederholt. Teile des Kolloquiums werden als

Blockveranstaltung gehalten. Die Zeiten werden zu Beginn des Semesters bzw. in dessen weiterem Verlauf rechtzeitig angekündigt.

Staatsexamenskolloquium Amerikanische Literatur

Dieses Kolloquium dient der gezielten Vorbereitung auf die fünf amerikanistischen Körbe des Staatsexamens English. Wir fokussieren zum einen auf literaturgeschichtliche Entwicklungen, zum anderen auf konkrete textanalytische Fragen anhand von Aufgabenstellungen früherer Examensphasen. Dabei konzentrieren wir uns zwar auf das vertieft studierte Lehramt, berücksichtigen aber auch die Spezifika des nicht vertieften Lehramts.
